

## Personal Income and Outlays, May 2020

Personal income decreased 4.2 percent while consumer spending increased 8.2 percent in May, according to estimates released today by the Bureau of Economic Analysis.

## Personal income

The decrease in personal income in May primarily reflected a decrease in government social benefits. "Other" social benefits decreased as payments to individuals from federal economic recovery programs continued, but at a lower level than in April. Partially offsetting the decrease in other government social benefits was an increase in unemployment insurance benefits, based primarily on unemployment claims data from the Department of Labor's Employment and Training Administration. ## **Consumer spending**

Consumer spending increased in May, reflecting increases in both goods and services.

- Within goods, the leading contributor to the increase
  was spending on new motor vehicles, especially new
  light trucks, based on unit sales from Ward's
  Automotive Sales Reports. Spending on recreational
  goods and vehicles also increased, reflecting Census
  Bureau Monthly Retail Trade Survey (MRTS) data.
- Within services, the leading contributor to the increase was spending on health care, based primarily on employment, hours, and earnings data from the Bureau of Labor Statistics Current Employment Situation report as well as credit card data. Other contributors to the increase were spending on food services and accommodations,
